DESCRIPTION

This file covers the period from July, 1984 to late spring/early summer, 1985. It is meant to complement the earlier collection, Chile, Protesta Nacional (1983-1984), and should be consulted jointly. The essential purpose in both collections is to document the evolution of the Chilean political situation. Particular emphasis has been given to the nature, organization, and strategy of the dozens of parties, factions, alliances and self-help groups which together compose the "Chilean opposition" to Pinochet.

The most important organizing event in this collection is the State of Siege (Estado de Sítio) imposed by Pinochet on 6 November, 1984. The siege was in part a reaction by Pinochet to the national protests held by the opposition on 29 and 30 October 1984 and was quickly followed by a crackdown on opposition leaders and various political organizations. Government measures included the arrest of hundreds and the detention of thousands. Increased tensions between a traditionally powerful Catholic church and the military government as well as a general state of confusion among the opposition resulted. In turn, this confusion inevitably led to a fizzling of the protests and attempted strikes held in defiance of the siege on 27 and 28 November 1984. This collection gives evidence of the struggle and test of wills which ensues between a renewed state power and a weakened but reticent opposition. It should help the researcher to explore the complicated dynamics which come to characterize an opposition which has to operate now almost strictly underground.

The materials in this collection also document the seemingly gargantuan organizational task which the opposition continued to set for itself - large

monthly protests. Through these pamphlets, serials, fliers and posters one may observe how difficult it became to structure these <u>protestas</u>; the kind of compromises which had to be negotiated between parties and party factions in order to make them possible; and, in general, one will be amazed by the indefatigable efforts of so many grass-roots organizers to coordinate the various sectors of the population (e.g., women, pobladores, workers).

Another event about which these materials give testimony is the way in which the earthquake which struck Santiago on 3 March 1985 (killing 124) was to have an important political meaning in this increasingly polarized country. The opposition was eager to denounce the government's sluggish reaction to cleaning up the devastation caused by the earthquake, thus capitalizing on a situation about which the Chilean government had become very sensitive.

The nature of the materials contained in this collection is diverse. It ranges from sophisticated political analysis to political literature such as pamphlets, daily bulletins, fliers, posters, and newspapers written for mass appeal. Taken as a whole, however, these materials form a clear image of what lies underneath the official veneer of everyday life under censorship and surveillance. The materials sometimes complement each other. What the party leadership and underground network of educated critics tell the researcher about the state of the opposition may in many instances be confirmed and enriched by the literature which pours endlessly from the rudimentary presses established by grass-roots

organizations more closely in touch with the feelings of the people.

The documents are organized according to issuing agency or broad subject group and arranged in chronological order. In addition to this collection, Firestone Library has on microfilm some extraordinary underground serials from this period (1984-85) which can be consulted for sophisticated appraisals of Chilean political life during the State of Siege.
